FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

March 1988

Perhaps like me, some of you have been watching the second series of television programmes entitled 'llospital Watch'. The daily programmes concentrated on the life of a large general hospital - in this case, Liverpool General - looking at its life through the eyes and experience of both staff and patients. Through a myriad of cases, some only briefly glimpsed, certain attitudes dominated: the willingness and determination of the staff to make the system work, i.e. to create a place where care and love would be shown; the sense of hope radiated by the nurses, even in the children's cancer ward where hope and laughter seemed strangely out of place, at least to the interviewer in the initial visits; a sense of trust by the patients that the hospital was trying to do its best, but against almost impossible odds.

My own reflection on the week's programmes was of a system - the National Health Service - which was falling apart. Ill-directed cost-cutting has piled up problems that threaten to bring down the whole edifice. The picture of that hospital - and Liverpool is in many ways no different from my experience of Northampton General - is a grim one. Wards taken out of action, nurses seeking other jobs, personnel cut-backs. The reason is simple: nurses cannot live on their pay. Many work as agency nurses over weekends to make ends meet. Those remaining, as dedicated as could be, have to do the work of those who have gone, or not been replaced, as well as their own. All this in hospitals which are not just the national, but the world's, leaders in their field.

We are constantly being encouraged to return to the Victorian values of thrift and self-help. But I wonder.... Thrift has its merits, but not to the neglect of the fabric. And least of all when it denies investment in people. The only Victorians who cried "self-help" were the ones who could afford it. Is there any value or truth in urging private

medicine when the number of homeless continues to rise, or of urging schools to opt out of the present system when the schools which are left lack funds and books? These are not political views, but hard facts.

The war cry "you can't solve a problem by throwing money at it" is another half-truth. Some problems cannot be solved by money. For others, it is the essence of the solution - like buying food for the table, clothes for one's back, and help for the sick. The Duchess of Kent, in the latest 'Age Concern' promotion, promises an elderly housebound person whose home-help had been removed, "we'll bring her back". But can they? And if so, who will pay? Cut-backs and miserly saving are the order of the day, but the final cost to the fabric of society is only just beginning to emerge.

When I became Warden of Ecton House five years ago, we had a healthy bank balance, but the House was shabby and in need of a lot of major repairs. We had saved, but forgotten or ignored the need to maintain or improve. Saving can become a dangerous obsession, particularly when its cost is met by those who cannot save.

Many people urge the Church to speak out. Well then, let's do it. Let's speak the moral truth about our decaying communities. Let's speak out about our divided nation, the haves and the havenots. Let's proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ who came that "we might all have life in its fullness" - not some of us, the lucky ones who can afford it, but all of us. Or, dare I say it, are there too many Christians who will welcome a further cut in income tax rather than a reinvestment in people in need?

The Christian Gospel is hard, and uncompromising. Let me remind you though, as we begin this Lent that at its root is a call to self-denial: not a storing-up, but a generosity of spirit and action that will bring about the Kingdom of God.

Mothering Sunday always coincides with the 4th Sunday in Lent, which this year will be on March 13th. The Brownies and Guides will join us for their monthly Parade Service at 9.30am on that day.

Friday 25th March, The Feast of the Annunciation, will also be the date for the Annual Parochial

Church Meeting. As a Church we are required, by law to meet once a year to elect churchwardens for the ensuing year, approve the annual accounts, and hear reports and comments from the parish. But for Ecton, this meeting is more than a legal requirement, with some food and a glass of wine, the A.P.C.M. is an opportunity to meet together and share more of our faith.

There will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7.0pm in the Church, followed by supper and meeting in the Rectory Room. Details of the supper etc will be available in Church.

Holy Week and Easter

The eight days from Palm Sunday to Easter— the journey of Christ from Jerusalem to the Cross—form the core of the Christian Gospel. Each day we read and reflect on the events of that week, seeking to grow in faith and understanding.

Maundy Thursday, taking its name from the anthem For the day, Mandatum Novum do volus -'a new commandment I give you; - focuses on the Last Supper with its dominant theme that we should love one another as Christ loves us. We move from the eucharist into the silence of the all-night vigil. The Church will remain open, hopefully warm to allow anyone the opportunity to sit by the Easter Garden, as we await the Risen Christ.

Easter Day. In the early Church, baptisms were performed only once a year, during the vigil eucharist of Holy Saturday - Easter Day. Nowadays we retain that symbolism by renewing our baptismal promises during the Easter Morning Eucharist. The Eucharist begins with the lighting of the great Easter Candle, from which all the baptismal candles are lit for the next year. This year, however, we shall have the real thing!!, because Lynne and Chris Gardner have asked me to baptise Jo-anna on Easter Sunday.

I shall be available throughout Holy Week for anyone who wishes counsel or confession. If you cannot be in Church at Easter, please let me know and I will willingly bring you Communion at home.

Betty Knight, as already acknowledged in Church, we record our thanks for the gift of £500 from Betty's estate.

The Rysbrack Bust

As a newspaper and television personality (!) I ought to explain not only my role in the Rysbrack Affair, but more importantly, perhaps, the future of the bust. The terracotta of John Archdeacon Palmer, was the original model by Rysbrack for the tomb of John Palmer placed in the chancel of the Church in 1732. The model was then "given" by Archdeacon Palmer's grand-niece to the Rectory of which her brother, Thomas was the then incumbant. The bust has therefore been in the Rectory, perhaps not always above the main fireplace, ever since. The recent excitement and publicity has been caused by the extraordinarily high prices which sculptures of this period have raised at auction. The director of Christie', tells me that there are only 200 known examples of Rysbrack's work and the Ecton Bust the only known extant example of the sculptor's own unaided handiwork. So much for the past

since February of last year, the Diocesan authorites have tried to untangle the question of its legal ownership. When Ecton House became the Retreat Conference Center for the Diocese in 1967, most of the ground floor of the Rectory was transferred from the Parsonage Board to the Glebe Committee.

Any part of the House which could be considered a fixture and formed part of the new center, was similarly transferred. It seems now that after taking legal advise the bust was not a fixture, but remained a chattel of the benefice house and hence its future lies with the Parsonage Board. This Diocesan Board is resposible for the provision and maintenance of parsonage housing throughout the Diocese. Since 1974, any sale of existing housing or any chattel of such housing, can only benefit the capital fund and not the particular parish or incumbent. The act of 1974 removed many anomalies in parsonage housing, especially the responsibility for maintenance etc from the parish. If the bust is sold, therefore the proceeds will not directly benefit the parish, but will do so indirectly in as much as the Rector of Ecton will always need a home in which to live. That's long-hand, for a short-hand comment. If we are to continue the restoration of the Church, then we need the 88 Festival more than ever, since none of the Rysbrack money will come our way. In the meantime, the cleaned and restored bust is in London awaiting its final outcome, and a copy now resides in Ecton House. Rest assured you'll hear more about it, while hopefully any future pictures of the incumbent in the local / national press will appear less fuzzy around the edges!



EASTER FLOWERS

We shall decorate the Church for Easter on Saturday 2nd April from 10.0am onwards.

All offers of help, greenery and flowers will be much appreciated. If you would like to give money towards the cost of the Easter flowers, please hand it to Margaret or Trevor.



This is the ideal time of the year to watch and learn to identify the birds which visit your garden. Of course a good view helps and a bird table or feeder will give you an advantage in this respect.

Let's look at those popular visitors, the Tits, first The Great Tit is easy to recognise with its black crown, white cheeks, and yellow underparts with a bold black stripe and bib. The Blue Tit is much smaller and less strongly marked with a blue cap and white cheeks; this is a very active and acrobatic bird and is the commonest of the Tits in our village. You might also see the Coal Tit which is as small as the Blue Tit but with a black crown and bib, white cheeks and a white patch on the back of the head. The Marsh and Long-tailed Tit are also occasional visitors.

Finches are also to be seen in our gardens, the commonest being the Chaffinch with its pink underparts, white wing bars and (on the male) pale blue crown. The male Greenfinch is unmistakable with its olive green plumage and bright yellow wing bar. The Bullfinch is equally distinctive with its bright pink underparts, blue-grey back and black crown and notice that huge seed-eating bill. The females of both these species have a much duller plumage.

Don't confuse the shy, brown and grey Dunnock or Hedge-Sparrow with the noisy ubiquitous House Sparrow. The former is not related to the Sparrows at all and is usually to be seen feeding on the ground with its mate never far away.

HENRY PINNEY: CHURCHWARDEN

When Trevor and Martin asked me to write an article for the Magazine about myself and my family, I responded willingly but afterwards a feeling of considerable apprehension decended over me.

I was born and bought up in Ecton, one of a large family of seven boys and two girls. We were all baptized in our lovely Church, several of us sang in the choir. My father was the Sexton of the Church for a number of years, this meant that several of us boys spent much of our spare time as teenagers tending the churchyard. It is perhaps somewhat ironical lithat after all these years, I am still helping to look after the churchyard. My fater was also a sidesman for as long as I could remember.

My parents made considerable sacrifices in providing for us all, which they did with great kindness and devotion. When I think about them, as I do very often, I realise how fortunate I was, their teaching and example was an inspiration to all of us.

It may be of interest to know that members of our family of Pinnies were resident in Ecton for many years. I have been able to trace my ancestors back to 1837 ! perhaps one day I will be able to trace further back still.

I was a member of the Church Lads Brigade from the age of 14 or was it 13 ! until I joined the R.A.F. in 1939. My first company was Billing and Ecton, then when this was disbanded I joined Earls Barton Company. I remember with pride that one year we won most of the battalion trophies and these were displayed in Ecton Church.

In early 1939 I was very unsettled at work so I made enquires about service in the R.A.F. I found that it appealed to me so I enlisted in April of that year. Bearing in mind that we did'nt travel very far from home in those days, and only once had I stayed away from home, at Church Lads Brigade Annual Camp, leaving my family was a terrible wrench.

Finding myself living in a Barrack room with many others, and suddenly being subject to service discipline, which in those days was no picnic to say the least, was a very traumatic experience indeed.

I met Johan in 1942, she was serving in the W.A.A.F, we were both stationed near Stranaer. Our friendship blossomed into marriage and we married in the Church of Scotland in Johan's home town of Wisham in Scotland in April 1943. Johan first visited Ecton during the Christmas holiday 1942, so her connections with the village spans a good many years.

My service in the R.A.F. took me to quite a few countries overseas. My first postingwas to France in 1940, then in 1943 I was posted to India where I spent almost three years. After the war I spent three years in Kenya when Johan was able to join me. In 1955 I was posted to Egypt where I was involved in closing a large R.A.F. base, then to Jordan where much of my time was spent in more closing down, and recovering R.A.F. equipment, and shipping it out of the country. In 1960 I was posted to Cyprus when Johan was again able to join me. We spent three years in that lovely Island, such a tragedy that it is now divided into two nations.

Johan and I have three sons, (two of whom were baptised in Ecton Church) Peter, David and Graham, each has had experience of a number of schools, in Ecton, Yorkshire, Lincolnshire and Cyprus. Peter and David completed their "O" and "A" levels at boarding school in Brackley. Graham preferred to stay at home and went to Horncastle Grammar school, and then, when I retired from the R.A.F. in 1968, he attended Wellingborough Grammar school and gained his "O" and "A" levels. Each of our boys was able to further his education at University, which of course helped them in their chosen careers.

We have two grandchildren, Christopher and Jamie, both are getting on well at school and take part in football, swimming and Cub Scouts et.

When I retired from the R.A.F. I joined Wellingborough Urban District Council in the treasurers department, later Wellingborough Borough Council. As a second career I found it quite rewarding, it bought me into contact with members of the public. We like living in Wellingborough, it is a nice little town with adequate shopping and parking facilities, it is much changed since we came here. Both Johan and I found it difficult to settle down at the Church's which we attended so we decided to renew our connections with Ecton, to return to Ecton Church was more like coming home, we both enjoy it so much.
