'Wellingborough Deanery Mission' 15th-22nd May.



I wonder what that conjures up in your mind? The word 'mission' might make you think that people will be round to sell you bible advice with a foot in the door! You might receive glossy pamphlets similar to election manifestos!

'Wellspring', for that is the name of the mission is a chance for people in every parish in the deanery to celebrate and share their faith, and to encourage others to ask, "What does your faith mean to you? Why do you go to church on Sundays? What's it all about?

The week deliberately coincides with the celebration of Pentecost, the time the church thinks back to the day the first apostles received the Holy Spirit as Jesus had promised. The Spirit gave them strength and power to begin the spread of the gospel. It must have been quite something for numbers to have increased so rapidly, despite persecution; for Christianity to grow from a small band of followers into a major world religion.

We think of Pentecost as the birthday of the Church, so to say Happy Birthday to Fcton Church there will be:-

#### CD Reviews by Adrian Pulford

#### Martha Wainwright - Martha Wainwright

Old hippies like me may have Loudon Wainwright III records in their vinyl collection but in 1971 we wouldn't have thought that, having married Kate McGarrigle (of the renowned folk duo Kate & Anna McGarrigle), two of his offspring would be the toast of music critics and CD buying public alike in 2005.

Growing up in a family where music was the central focus, Martha sang on stage and in the studio from an early age. She began writing songs and performing in clubs while a drama student in her native Montreal.

This eponymous new album is remarkable and her emotional renditions of self-penned masterpieces like 'Far Away' and 'Factory' are excellent especially after a few listens. 'B.M.F.A.' – I won't give it its full title here, is the best track on the album. Full of pent-up sexuality and emotional angst this could be a depressing collection in the hands of a lesser talent but it's ultimately uplifting. Buy it.

#### Rufus Wainwright - Want Two

This is Rufus Wainwright's fourth album but finally the world (including me) is catching on according to a recent Guardian article: 'Want Two is doing well in Europe ("although once the Germans get it, you're f\*\*\*ed," says Rufus), but it occasionally occurs to Rufus that had he been a different kind of artist, had he concealed some sides of himself, his career might have taken off a while sooner.'

Charismatic, with a captivating voice (he sang 'Hallelujah' on the Shrek soundtrack) and a huge songwriting talent this breakthrough album is his catharsis after entering rehab and getting over a drug and drink fuelled attempt to self-destruct. With soaring orchestral arrangements and operatic vocals these songs were written before during and after his 'breakdown' and although full of such diverse influences the whole effect is powerful and again ultimately uplifting.

That two such towering talents should emerge from one family maybe says something for the power of breeding. Anyway if you buy this album and enjoy it, you might want to delve into Rufus's back catalogue of albums 'Want One', 'Rufus Wainwright' and 'Poses'. I will. James Blunt – Back To Bedlam

"Beautiful dawn, lights up the shore for me, there is nothing else in the world I would rather wake up and see, with you". The opening lines of 'High', the first track of this album and the first single, sum up the simple beauty of James Blunt's singer / songwriter's talent. The rest of the songs on the album are superb especially the second single 'Wisemen'.

Coming from a military family with no one having a musical bone in their body his background not be more of a contrast to the Wainwright's musical schooling, his father considering all music a redundant noise. Yet ironically his music owes more to Loudon Wainwright's style than either Martha or Rufus's output.

His life-story is nothing short of unique. A British Army career saw him stationed in Kosovo as part of NATO's peacekeeping force. He then protected the Queen on horseback and the Queen Mother whilst she lay in state. Within weeks of leaving the Army he was in the USA and after one live show was signed to Atlantic recording 'Back To Bedlam' in Los Angeles. I love this album and so does everyone I've played it to. You may well enjoy it too, so take a listen.

#### **Ecton Recycling centre**

I have just visited a recycling centre (dechetterie) in France and have a suggestion for a major improvement at the Ecton site. In France you drive into the recycling centre up a concrete slope and park adjacent to the bin you wish to use. You just have to drop the items to be disposed of into the bin below, no climbing slippery ramps, no lifting to get items into the bin and furthermore you can dispose of large items in the same way.

Obviously the French do not have to comply with European health and safety legislation as we do, the need for guard rails to stop you falling in etc. (which helps)

Ecton improvements for 2005

- 1) New signs to help you find right bin (already there in France)
- Meet & Greet to provide assistance (If its not too busy)
- 3) Future plans state that the site is to be redesigned to help unloading facilities (Perhaps a trip to France first)

The two recycling centres I visited in France seemed to be run by no more than 2 people (just to answer any queries) whereas the Ecton centre has a major workforce.

RETIRING CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Since our 2004 AGM we have seen our dreams come true with the official re-opening of the Hall in July by the Mayor of Wellingborough; a very good article appeared in the Wellingborough Link magazine, giving us some good publicity.

We got over our final financial hurdle through generous interest-free loans from villagers and friends; this sum of £9,500 enabled us to complete the project. These loans were given on the understanding they would be repaid within 10 years; I am pleased to say that nearly half have already been paid back.

All this has been achieved by some very successful fundraising events. I believe the success of these events is down to the fact that they are a social occasion as well as fundraising and we all know that Ecton folk know how to enjoy themselves – the sight of so many 'skilled performers' at the Barn Dance was something to remember – or should I say forget!!

Since re-opening we have seen an increase in bookings with a large variety of usage from Spanish Classes to Golden Wedding celebrations. My thanks and appreciation go to Maureen Robinson, who keeps the hall spick and span, to our Treasurer, Sylvia Saunders, who never makes a fuss but just gets on with the job and keeps our

#### Book Review

#### One Shot by Lee Childs

'One Shot' is the ninth book in Lee Child's series about retired US military cop Jack Reacher, and it's the real deal: a stunningly original, and superbly orchestrated thriller. It delivers a high body count, yet has more intelligence that practically any other book in the crime/thriller genre.

The author's clipped, laconic, to-the-point narrative and stylistic mannerisms mirrors the speech and acute thinking of Reacher. Incredibly, Lee Child is British, but his writing voice, and his hero, is more authentically American than Thanksgiving Day and pumpkin pie.

The initial opening sequences of a sniper acting alone seem, at first, deceptively simple. But from them, Lee spins a whole web of complexities and develops the plot with enormous skill. By the end of the book you're acknowledging that he's a master magician who's pulled off many great sleight-of-hand tricks that you didn't see coming.

I ask myself when the last time was that I read a thriller with as many breath-catching twists as 'One Shot'? Twists that surprise yet make perfect logical sense when you think about them afterwards. Each one a brilliant set piece that detonates in the brain and gets one figuratively slapping the thigh in admiration, and thinking, "that blasted Lee Child got me again!"

Books 6,7 and 8 in the series, for me, offered no progression from their predecessors. Respectively, 'Without Fail' is easily the low point in the sequence; 'The Persuader' merely marked time; and last year's 'The Enemy' though good, took a backward step into Reacher's army days. The good news is that 'One Shot' finds Lee Child once again writing at the top of his game and through it he has breathed new life into the entire series. If, like me, you loved the first five books I can't see you being disappointed with this latest volume.

Most of the titles in the sequence would make terrific action movies. But I know of no established actor - step forward the usual suspects: Willis, Arnie, Seagal, Vin Diesel etc - has anywhere near enough toughness, charisma, intelligence, believability and sheer physical size to do justice to the character of one-man army Jack Reacher. And ladies, you're going to love him too!

Any reviewer who expresses rage and loathing for a novel is preposterous. He or she is like a person who has put on full armour and attacked a hot fudge sundae.

The covers of this book are too far apart.





#### Jude's Easy Peasy Recipes

All recipes serve 4 (ish)

#### Mushroom Bhaji

3-4 tablespoons cooking oil

1 onion, finely chopped

2-3 cloves of garlic, crushed

1/2 teaspoon turmeric

1/2 teaspoon chilli powder

1 teaspoon ground coriander

1 teaspoon cumin

1 teaspoon tomatoe puree

8 oz mushrooms, chopped

Heat oil; fry onions until browned. Lower heat, add garlic and spices, fry, adding a tablespoon of water to stop sticking. Repeat, if necessary, for 5 minutes. Add tomatoe puree, mix well. Add mushrooms, mix well. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons of water. Cover with pan lid and simmer for about 10 minutes.

#### Sweet Potatoe and Chick Pea Curry

10 oz sweet potatoes, peeled and roughly chopped

1 tin tomatoes

1 tin chick peas, drained

2 tablespoons mild curry paste

2 teaspoons chilli powder

4 oz baby spinach leaves

2 tablespoons chopped fresh coriander

Boil sweet potatoes in pan of water for 10-12 minutes until tender. Meanwhile, in a saucepan stir together tomatoes, chickpeas, chilli and curry paste and simmer gently for about 5 minutes. Drain sweet potatoes and add to mixture. Stir in spinach leaves and coriander. Heat until spinach has wilted.

#### Lentil Curry

2 tablespoons sunflower oil

2 onions, chopped

4 tablespoons curry paste

1 1/2 pints vegetable stock

750g stew pack vegetables

6oz red lentils

1/4 teaspoon turmeric

Heat oil in large heavy pan. Fry onions for about 8 minutes until golden brown. Stir in curry paste and cook for a minute. Slowly pour in stock, stirring continually. Add rest of ingredients and simmer for 20-25 minutes.
