

#### Changes at the Church

Over the next three months a number of changes are planned to improve our music and accommodation for meetings.

The 1889 Trustam Pipe organ is due to be removed in December and is destined for St. Mary's, Harlington in Bedfordshire. Trustam was a Bedford organ builder and our instrument is considered a fine example of those times being almost original, but after 115 years sterling work it is almost worn out. Restoration will cost over £20,000, but Harlington have raised the money and all works are being undertaken by Michael Latham who has looked after the organ at Ecton for 10 years or more. His firm is now merged with Tickell and Co, Ltd - also a Northampton firm.

Until the new electronic organ is supplied, Makins the manufacturer will lend us an instrument which will be located on the South Side of the Nave adjoining the Lady Chapel. A number of speakers will be placed along some South Window Ledges to spread the sound. It won't be up to cathedral standard but will fill the gap.

In the New Year Underwood and Weston will convert the now spacious vestry area into a meeting room with access for the disabled on two sides. This will enable wheel chairs to get up along side the High Altar Communion Rail when required.

The west facing arch will be filled in, with an oak faced door to match that on the tower. The south arch will be half glazed, again with an oak faced door, to gain entry to the choir. The organ console will stand between the choir stalls and the recess created beneath the glazed area.

That's the basics: lighting, flooring and decoration have yet to be decided and will depend on funds available. If all goes well we should be up and running by Easter 2005. In the meantime, there is bound to be some disruption but we hope to keep this to the minimum. We hope you will all understand

#### Looking for somewhere to go then try PIDDINGTON MUSEUM

The Upper Nene Archaeology Society, under the directionn of Roy and Liz Friendship Taylor, have been excavating a Roman Villa since 1979, located in a farmers field on the outskirts of the village of Piddington. A redundant chapel in the village, has been turned into a Museum displaying some of the thousands of items found on the site, which encapsulates the whole period of the Roman occupation, starting with pre-roman round houses, the various periods of the villa, including its destruction by fire and its occupancy by local traders and small farmers until Anglo/Saxon times.

The UNAS has received funding from the lottery which has enabled the Museum to have its display units made to a high standard, and it was recently opened by Tony Robinson of Time Team fame. The Museum is open on Sunday afternoons until March, from 2-4 but it would be advisable to ring 01604 870312 to confirm this. Entrance fees are £3.50 for adults and £2.00 for children, disabled and senior citizens. Parking is in Spread Eagle pub car park with a walk a walk down the footpath to Chapel End.

# OLD ENGLISH CHRISTMAS PLUM PUDDING

To make what is termed a pound pudding, take of raisins well stoned, currants thoroughly washed, one pound each; chop a pound of suet very finely and mix with them; add a quarter of a pound of flour, or bread very finely crumbled, three ounces of sugar, one ounce and a half of grated lemon-peel, a blade of mace, half a small nutmeg, one teaspoonful of ginger, half a dozen eggs well beaten; work it well together, put it into a cloth, tie it firmly, allowing room to swell, and boil not less than five hours. It should not be suffered to stop boiling.





#### REM - Around The Sun

I sometime wonder if I'm listening to or watching the same things as critics who write reviews in the national press, and this new offering from REM is a classic example.

After reading two poor reviews of 'Around the Sun' I almost didn't bother to pre-order this album. However, as I have every other REM album in my collection I thought I'd make my own mind up. Boy am I glad I did! This is a superb collection of classic REM songs – I'll be listening to them for the rest of my life just like the songs from 'Automatic For The People' and 'Out Of Time'.

Prior to writing for 'Around The Sun' Michael Stipe had lost his muse but encouraged by Bono who said 'we're songwriters—just write the songs' he has written some typically enigmatic lyrics that are intertwined with haunting REM-penned melodies and classic pop hooks.

REM are, even to the critics of this album, a class act and though this superb set doesn't break new ground, it's a wonderful collection of songs if you love REM and a great way to fall in love with their music if you don't already own lots of it.

Opening with the evocative new single 'Leaving New York' and featuring twelve other tracks including the infectious 'Wanderlust', the hauntingly beautiful 'Outsiders' and the epic 'Boy In The Well' – my advice is buy this record and enjoy it despite what the critics might say.

#### Brian Wilson - Gettin In Over My Head / Smile

That 62 year-old Brian Wilson is alive, let alone touring the UK with 'Pet Sounds' and 'Smile' is a miracle after more than thirty years in a wilderness of madness, sickness, obesity and drugs. However he is back, and as anyone who has seen his recent shows live or on TV will testify this is indeed A WONDERFUL THING.

On that basis, and the fact that the mid-90's 'Imagination' was a superb BW album, I bought 'Gettin In Over My Head'. Oh dear! It's hard to recommend anything on this album as being of the standard you might expect from a legendary genius — the songs are ropey, the production average and the collaborations with Elton (How Could We Still Be Dancin'), Macca (A Friend Like You) and Eric (City Blues) trite and ill at ease. There is good music here but you've got to be a die-hard fan to get to it through stuff you'd only want to listen to once. Brian duetting with his long departed brother Carl on 'Soul Searchin' is poignant but flawed and some of the Van Dyke Parks stuff is interesting to us fans — but that's about it I'm afraid.

As an antidote to this you could listen to 'Smile' Brian Wilson's 'lost album' from the sixties released at last in September 2004. There's some weird stuff on this too – but where else could you listen to 'Heroes and Villains', 'Surf's Up' and 'Good Vibrations' in that order as originally intended on the same album?
