

VANDALISM

The Parish council at a recent meeting discussed the problem of vandalism in Ecton, particularly on the playing field.

During the past few months damage has been caused to the stone wall, 2 village seats and 2 trees. This has resulted in the parish council having to use parish precept money, which has been set aside for other purposes. The parish precept money is needed by the parish council to pay for services throughout the village e.g. street lighting, playing field maintenance and grass mowing, bus shelters, insurance, etc., etc.

The precept for 2003/2004 is £8,490.00. If money has to be used for repairs following acts of vandalism then the parish council will need to increase the precept for 2004/2005. Any increase will result in the council tax being increased to cover the cost. For every extra £100 raised by the parish precept, it will cost each household an additional 0.34p per year. This is of course in addition to any council tax increases made by the County council, Wellingborough Borough Council and the Police. The parish council, therefore urge parishioners to be vigilant and report any acts of vandalism immediately to the POLICE: Tel: 01933 440333. A follow up call to a member of the parish council would also be very much appreciated

Since that time we have seen the number of participating churches go up from six to eleven, and turnover increase dramatically as a result. In addition to selling through the churches we have held several successful 'At Home' evenings promoting Fair Trade, and the Fair Trade Lunch attended by many of you and our MP Paul Stinchcombe was a resounding success. Together we have raised awareness of the issue of Fair International Trade locally, and I know that, as a result, Paul has raised the matter of our concerns with the Prime Minister.

On a personal note, we have been informed that we are amongst the top ten new Fairtraders for the last year, and have been invited to a national seminar to discuss our success in order to help other new traders.

The future is certainly looking good for Traidcraft locally too, as we are negotiating with five more churches to join us, and have identified a further three to contact in the future.
