

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FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY



JULY AND AUGUST

O Lord you have searched me out and known me.

Psalm 139.

As I read the offices of morning and evening prayers, I am drawn more and more to the riches of the psalms. Authentic faith uses the words 'I and You' not the 'we', or the 'they', or the 'one' - the impersonal, second hand language which so easily becomes the Church. The Psalms are filled with the personal experiences - some we accept readily, the loving, generous response - others seem to our modern ears to be out of place, the psalmist, anger towards his God, his cry for

vengeance - and sometimes his desire
to put words into God's mouth. Modern
day man seeks to please everyone,
'don't upset him, grin and bear it, its
not worth the trouble', but these have
no place in the Psalmist's thoughts.
The Psalms reflect the whole of the
writer's life - the bad as well as the
good - the anger as much as the love the pain as much as the joy- the darkness as much as the light - and here, we
all have much to learn - to recognise
that the God who calls, knows us as we
are, warts and all, and wants to use
everything of what we are in his service.

We all know the bitterness and anger which lies just below the surface in some people, but it is that anger which scars their lives - meanness takes the place of generosity and sarcasm the word of love. "Offer them to God", says the Psalmist and allow Him to transform them." Theresa of Avila grumbles with her God, only because she knows that he loves her, and accepts her ---her let me add, not because he dosen't want her to change, but he can only change us when we fully recognise and accept ourselves. Psalm 149.

"The Lord takes delight in his people"
The well from which you drink is given
by God he fills and we drink as
Martin Buber speaks of the I - Thou
relationship in faith - the intimacy
of our relationship with God. So with
this Psalm 139 not composed of careful
critical, language, but it does express
some profound thoughts about God than
gain their validity as much out of
their expemential authenticity as of
their presence in Scripture.

The writer opens up for us another way of seeing of life under God and or need for forgiveness - one of the burdens of our Protestant faith is the bewilderment of our sinful nature - we are so good at saying how awful we are that we sometimes forget that we are made by God - the writer stands before God, as one who has walked and still desires to walk the Lord's way - he has failed, that he knows, but nonetheless by the grace of God he will walk again in the power of God's forgiveness.

Omniscience God knows us v.2 in a way that no one else does, not even ourselves - but that knowledge is not daming.

Omnpresence the companionship of God in the Spirits with us, who prayers in every moment, in every place, in every circumstance for us.

Wherever we turn, God meets us as protecting and judging presence - so none of us can ever be cut off from the presence of God - not by him at least. The hand of God holds us and he is with us.

"But temper that also". It is a terrible thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

We have always been part of God in his mind. Even at my end I am still with God vv18

In our death we are caught up in the memory of God, remembered by God, held forever in the hand and mind and heart of God.

July and August are fairly quiet months. Except that on July 22nd the Patronal Festival of Mary Magdalene, there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7.opm, followed by a Party. Women's Institute


Miss Baddley, an SRN for 20 years who now runs her own clinic in Wellingborough, described and demonstrated foot reflexology to a packed June meeting. Her fascinating introduction to the ancient technique which originates from China was amusingly interspersed with "stories the feet can tell".

By pressing with the thumb on areas of the feet and hands which correspond to a "body map", the aim is to reduce muscle tension and increase blood flow, thus relaxing the subject, easing pain and reducing blood pressure. It would be difficult to thank everyone individually for all the help that we received both for the Coffee and Cake morning and the Jumble Sale. So will everyone who supported us in any way please accept this as a very grateful 'Thankyou'.

BISHOP PAUL'S EARLY REFLECTIONS

Becoming a bishop makes one a target for good advice. One piece I received, from a former diocesan bishop, was to enjoy myself.

So far that has been easy. Pat and I are grateful for the welcome and understanding we have received, which have made the transition to this new post an enjoyable one. Two early

reflections seem worth sharing.

 I find it a joy as I begin visiting our churches and discovering what goes on. In a variety of settings already, be it at a crowded Whit Sunday at Brackley, or the Chapel at the Young Offenders' Institution at Wellingborough, or a flower festival at Brafield-on-the-Green, I have found numbers of lay folk giving much time to furthering the Church's service to the community. I hope and believe that what I have seen so far is merely the tip of the iceberg. I use that word because I recall God's Frozen People, a book focusing on the under-used laity of the Church and their need to be "unfrozen" and released for service. That process seems to be under way in Peterborough Diocese but there is still much to do in training and allowing the laity to play a fuller part in the work of the Church. I shall enjoy leading the new Board for the Development of Ministry in this Diocese, as it explores further ways of making our churches more fully effective instruments of God's tireless grace.

2. A second impression is of a piece of unfinished business. I refer to the Church Urban Fund. Representing the Diocese at a recent Lambeth meeting I learned that Peterborough lags far behind in our response to the Fund. Presumably one reason for this is that the recent scale and pace of pastoral reorganisation here has diverted energy and attention from other pressing issues, not least



the Church Urban Fund. The Fund exists to support schemes and projects in areas of widespread human need and distress. We in Peterborough live in an area of increasing growth and prosperity with much to be thankful for. In terms of that prosperity many of the Fund targets set for individual parishes are minimal. Many parishes will surely want to exceed their targets. I am enjoying working with the Diocesan group dealing with the Church Urban Fund. A national week highlighting the Fund will take place in September, with a Cathedral Service and a distribution of candles (to represent "Light in the City") to all 364 parishes. Please don't miss out on this.

Another piece of advice came to me at the time of my ordination in 1960. A bishop long engaged in a tough overseas ministry sent me a terse postcard from across the world. It read simply "The Holy Spirit does lead". Nearly thirty years on I have been aware of the truth of that, many times. It is, and will be a joy to discover that it is true in Peterborough too.
