

# FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

When I was a child and went to school it seemed that to challenge authority would be on a par with committing a great sin. What the teachers said was rarely challenged by the pupils or the parents. At one deeply unhappy time in primary school our class was ruled by a large man who took every opportunity to beat his children with a cane. The thrashing I received one day for a mistake I certainly did not make will live in my memory for ever, and I promise you that I did not cry openly. The authority of the parson, the squire in the village, the teacher in the school, the policeman on his beat and the doctor in his surgery never seemed to be challenged. It was thought that they knew best and anyone who criticised was considered a malcontent. How times have changed! Now it seems that all authority is being challenged and ridiculed. Morale in the police force is said to be at an all-time low. There are many many signs of a breakdown in the social structure of our country, particularly in areas of law and order. You cannot assume that if you leave your car in either town or country that it will be there when you return to drive away. Some would say that there is no respect for God, man, beast or car-owner.

To take a low view and dismiss everybody as being an anarchist would be stupid in the extreme. Clearly there are many people who respect the law and would wish to have a proper regard for authority. These people are as upset as I am by the present situation and deeply saddened when God is reviled; the innocent are tormented and the animal kingdom abused. I believe that once again in the history of mankind the teaching of Jesus Christ is of paramount importance for the saving of our civilisation. Being kind to our neighbours and being good to the poor could be said to be the essence of our religion. What is also needed, so it seems to me, is a right judgement in all things and the growth of a holy life based on a belief that Jesus is the Saviour of the world. Many find when

walking in His steps that they are led on to a deeper understanding of what life is about. Jesus is to be found at the centre of all creation, therefore through faith we can learn how to live.

The Faith is not dead. It continues to be practised by countless Christians in our own country during times of great difficulty, but what would be a great blessing is the strengthening of the churches. A weak Church is not good for the state of health of our nation. The teaching of Jesus Christ does not lead us to a life of servility, but to one of freedom in the Gospel. It is a freedom that is able to withstand anything the world can throw at us. It helps us to be authoritative in the right way and to know what authority is good or bad. This is no blind acquiescence to dictators. However, there is a growing recognition that a well ordered society needs an authority which is based on Christian morality and Godly virtues. During the time of the collapsing Roman Empire and during the worst times of the Dark Ages, the Christian church set a wonderful example. Christians were noted for their personal discipline and willingness to be the best kind of servant. It could be claimed at these times of great crisis that Jesus saved the world through His followers. Is it reading too much into what is happening in a rapidly changing world to claim that the same example is required today in every walk of life?

I am tired of yobbish attitudes and behaviour wherever and whenever they are found. Remember the older person can be as guilty as the young. The only answer for me is to be found in the teachings of Jesus Christ. What about us? Let us share our thoughts and feelings at all levels of village and parochial life.

#### ECTON CHARITIES

Many of our readers will know that the Scheme for the Ecton Charities has now been approved by the Charity Commissioners. The original six Charities have now been merged into two and renamed the Education Charity and the Relief in Need Charity.

The Commissioners have clearly defined the capital which is available for each Charity and the purposes that the income therefrom can be put to.

The result is that the Educational Charity has a substantial cash endowment whilst the Relief in Need Charity has a capital sum of less than £100.

In the past the older residents of Ecton have always received Christmas boxes from the Charity but it would now seem that these were paid for by what was, in effect, the Education Charity and not by the Relief in Need. The new Charities Act prevents the Trustees from mixing the two and so there are simply not the funds to make similar gifts in future.

- \* Appointed by Northamptonshire County Council: Gordon Gee
- \* The Rector is the ex-officio Trustee and Chairman.

#### STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN

A note to thank all of our Parishioners who responded to our Stewardship Campaign. We anticipate that our pledged income, together with tax rebates, will be in the region of £12500 each year for the next four years. This should cover increases in our Parish Share and other foreseeable expenses.

#### ECTON PARISH COUNCIL

First of all let me apologise for not keeping the magazine articles going. Over the last few months the publication of the magazine has not been compatible with the Parish Council meetings making any news history before it could be published. I know that the grapevine works well in Ecton and since not a lot has been happening I've taken a little rest!

To bring you up-to-date then. We haven't had a lot of success in persuading the Highways Department to implement a "traffic calming" scheme through the village. It had been hoped that works of a minor nature such as parking bays in the High Street could be introduced but we have been told that this restricts the overall available width of highway too much to construct any permanent feature. The closure of the Wellingborough Road into Ecton would not be entertained by the Traffic Police, but we haven't given up. Requests are being made to the Highways Department to at least look at reinforcing the signage and roadmarkings into the village in an effort to slow drivers down. On the plus side, the money allocated for us may now be able to be used to modify the Bus Stop at the Worlds End to make it easier for people to get up the steps onto the buses. we have confirmation of this a small meeting will be called to get the views of the Over 60's and the Mums and Tots.

Following a request to the County Council, modifications have been made to the stile in Franklins Close and indeed several additional stiles and footpath signs have been erected around the village. Staying with Franklins Close, Wellingborough Council have recently painted the fronts and doors of the garages and intend very shortly to clear away the rubbish from behind them. Although the road was not resurfaced in the original scheme and therefore not eligible for the remedial resurfacing, we have been promised that Franklins Close will be surfaced during this coming year.

Over the last few weeks our street lighting seems to have taken on a life of its own, going on and off erratically so the Council has made a request to East Midlands Electricity Board for an annual "check up" on all the lights in the village.

One advance notice, Operation Springclean will take place in Ecton on Saturday, 24th April, starting from Ecton House at 9.30 a.m. Those of us that take part always have a good time and everyone agrees that the village looks so much nicer afterwards, so do come and join in, remember its your village!
