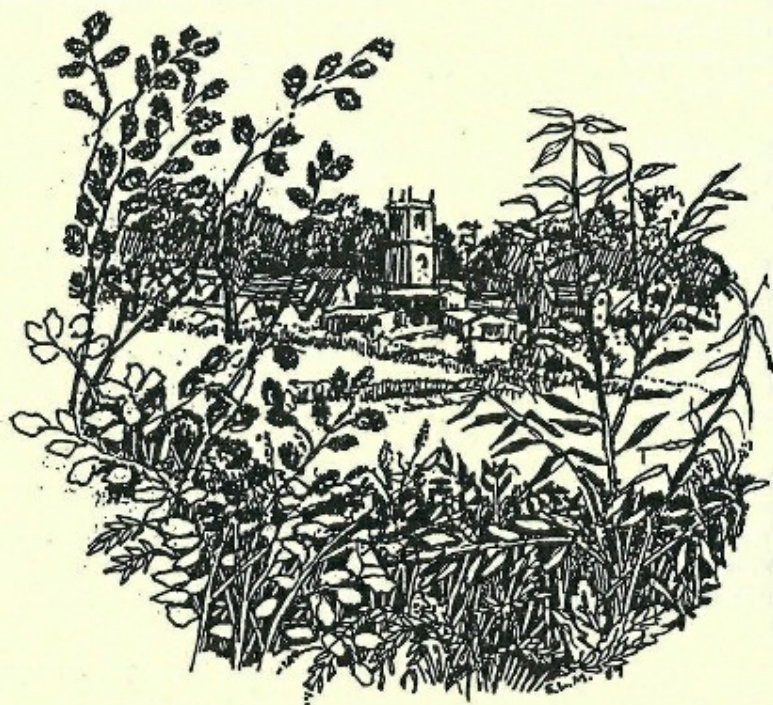

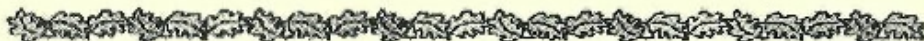

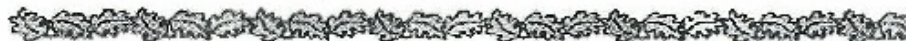

## Letter from Bungoma

To: All Clergy

We have just received this disturbing news from Bishop Eliud in Bungoma dated 2 September. Please bring this to your congregation's attention and remember him and his family in your prayers. Bishop Eliud wrote:

'Last week we had the privilege to host two friends from Peterborough [CRE: from Christ the King] Agnes Rees and Helen from Kettering. She videotaped many place she visited and I hope will share the information with you.

Although we had the joy of sharing with them, the night they left, a 10 man gange raided my house, terrorised the family demanding for money which a mzungu [white] had allegedly left with us! They wanted to get the bishop and kill him. Our friends had not left any money with us.

By God's grace, I had left early that morning for Mombasa to attend an NCC [National Christian Council] meeting. Caren was tied up together with our children. Our good computer was taken, the radio, our bedding, clothes and all the money the family had kept for use, about KSh 2000 [£20] was taken. Thank the Lord they spared their lives. We are here as a diocese now grappling with the situation. What happened to us, as Paul said, has helped to advance the gospel, my family is traumatised but our resolved to serve the Lord has been strengthened.

Now that we are not on e-mail, our communication will be rather slow. We thank God for providing close friends like you with whom we share our common tribulations and prayers.'

## HELPING CHILDREN WHO LOSE A PARENT

*It is now widely known that there are bereavement care services for those who are widowed and for parents whose child has died. Less well-known is a charity called Winston's Wish, which supports those caring for a bereaved child.*

The Winston's Wish Family Line can offer information and advice to anyone concerned about a bereaved child or young person. They also have contacts for similar services throughout the UK. The charity was founded in 1992 by Julie Stokes, a clinical psychologist working at the Gloucestershire Royal Hospital. Julie took a Winston Churchill Travel Bursary to the USA and Canada to study how bereaved children were supported - hence Winston's Wish.



**The Family Line (0845 2030405)** started in 2001, sponsored by the insurance company Swiss Life (UK). Calls are charged at local rate; some last ten minutes, some over an hour. In the line's first year there were over 3,500 callers.

Parents who find themselves alone because a partner has died may feel overwhelmed at first and find it especially difficult to help their children who are also grieving. The charity produces a range of resources, including memory boxes, and booklets for those supporting bereaved children.

Childhood is often thought to be a time when children should be free from difficulties and challenging life events, says the booklet, but this is seldom the case. Many parents think that by not talking about a death, their children will not be affected and will therefore not need to worry. However, it can often be more helpful to talk about what is happening so that children feel included and valued. When children are not told things, they feel left out and are often confused. Sometimes this can result in them blaming themselves for what happened.

*Other services that can be accessed through Winston's Wish include home visits to assess the needs of each bereaved family and residential 'Camp Winston' weekends for children aged 4-18. There is specialist support for those affected by suicide. These and other services are free in Gloucestershire (if the bereaved family lives elsewhere, contact the charity for information).*

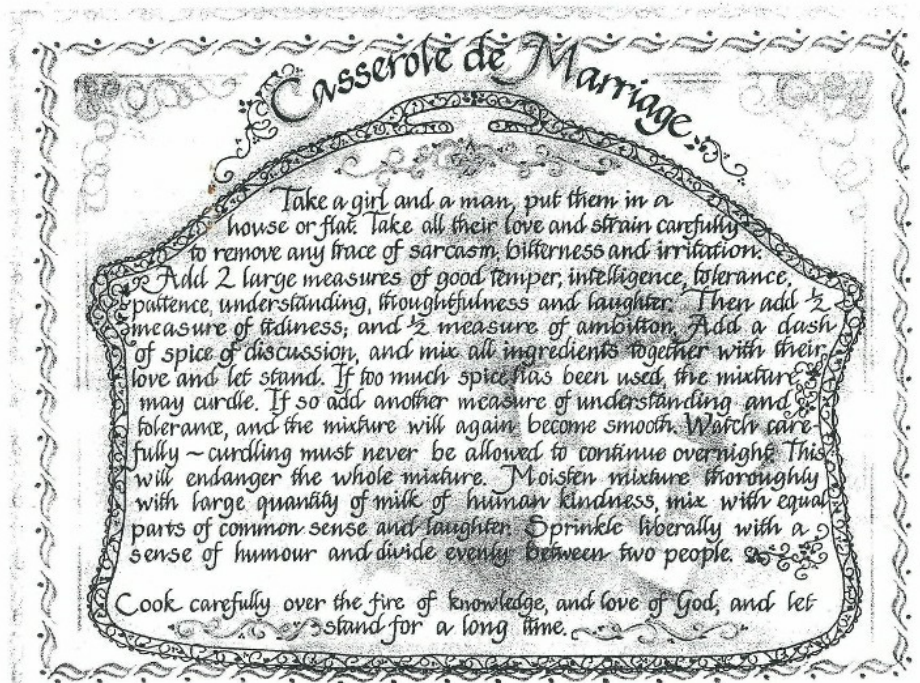

ECTON PARISH COUNCIL

MINUTES of a meeting of Ecton Parish Council held at Ecton Village Club on Monday 15 July 2002.

Present: Mr D C Dicks (Chairman)

Mrs K Humphreys, Mrs S Ingram, Mrs S Saunders, Dr A Bantock, Messrs, M Creed, T Green and T Moffet

41/02 Apologies for absence were received from Mr Wilson and Cllr K Payne.

42/02 The Minutes of the meeting held on 20 May 2002 were approved and signed.

43/02 Matters arising from the Minutes

- (a) Lower Ecton Lane: The Chairman read a copy letter from Mr J Crabtree to the County Council regarding the new restrictions on vans and pick-ups using the Civic Amenity Tips in the County. It was considered that these restrictions can only increase the amount of illegal tipping and therefore add to the clear-up costs. It was agreed to write to the County Council asking what additional resources are being provided to collect the illegally tipped rubbish which is now being dumped. Copies will be sent to T. Clarke MP, P Stinchcombe MP, S. Elsey (BC), P Townson (WBC) Supt. M R McCulley, Northamptonshire Police. WBC would be advised that some of the rubbish has been at the bottom of the village for some time.  
Mr Creed expressed concern over the rubbish being dumped in Washbrook Lane but he had been in contact with WBC and this had been cleared, normally within a week.
- (e) Bus Shelter: Mr Dicks reported that he had taken up the matters raised at the Annual Parish Meeting with the County Council and had been assured that the steps are the correct size. However, the original steps will be left in situ. Noted that the project is not yet complete.
- (c) Gravel Extraction Plan: Following the last meeting the County Council had called a meeting of all interested Parish Councils and this had been chaired by Hansons. Mr Green and Mr Wilson had represented Ecton. The main recommendations to come from this meeting were that the excavation from the designated areas A - D on the plans should be reversed in an attempt to minimise traffic flow. Concern was also expressed over the proposed working house (12 hours per day, seven days a week). It was agreed to write to the County Council supporting these observations.
- (d) Ecton Hall Lamp: The Insurers for Ecton Hall had denied liability for the damage to the lamp and the Clerk had taken up the matter with NALC, who had referred it to their Legal Department. Mrs Ingram was of the opinion that this light is the property of Ecton Hall and not the Parish Council and this will be looked into.
- (e) Ecton Youth Club: A letter of thanks had been received from Mrs Tinson regarding the Council's grant to cover the rent of the Village Club for one year.

44/02 Sywell Airfield: It was noted that the Appeal had been withdrawn. Mr Bletsoe Brown had signed the form listing the conditions included in the Planning Permission.

The Consortium had taken legal advice regarding Wellingborough Borough Council's handling of the original application, particularly relating to people being refused access to the latest Environmental Report. Counsel's opinion is being sought on whether there are grounds for a Judicial Review. This will cost in the region of £500 and it was agreed that the sum of £50 would be contributed towards the cost of this opinion. If Counsel considers that a Judicial Review is appropriate then the costs involved in this could be between £7000 and £10000. Sywell has pledged for a large proportion of this. However, it has to be considered whether, if the Review was unsuccessful, the Consortium would be liable to pay Wellingborough Council's costs and advice is being sought on this also. A Review would not be able to rescind the permission but the conditions attached to it could be amended.

The Parish Council had been advised by NALC that a contribution towards the costs of such a Review, and the possible expenditure of about £1000 (to be taken from Section 137 allocation) would need the general consent of the Parish. It was agreed that if action was required before the next Parish Council meeting in September Mrs Ingram, Mr Dicks, Mr Green and Mr Wilson would prepare a letter to all residents outlining the proposals and inviting them to a public meeting on a date to be agreed.

45/02 Planning:

A letter had been received regarding amendments to the Local Plan but these were not relevant to Ecton Parish.

A copy letter had been received from the Ecton Barns developer confirming that outstanding works would be completed within the next 10/12 days.

Mr Green reported that the Village Club had been unsuccessful in their bid for lottery funding. It might therefore be necessary to submit new plans and asked the Parish Council if the application could be made by the Parish Council, as previously. Agreed.

46/02 Street Lighting: The only defective light was the column in Blacksmith's Yard, which had been reported.

47/02 Highway Matters: A letter had been received from the County Council who had agreed to inspect the area in Lower Ecton Lane (as requested following the last meeting). The grass had been cut back along the A4500 between Ecton and Earls Barton but the path was almost completely covered and required siding out. It is hoped that this will be done in the near future.

48/02 Financial Matters:

(a) Accounts for payment: The following accounts were approved for payment: NALC - Internal Audit Fees £175.75 and Cornhill - additional insurance premium; both paid out of meeting. ABB Lighting ££124.61, Powergen £126.42 and Mrs P Hall (Salary/Expenses) £129.57.

(b) Precept for 2003/04: It was agreed that the precept figure for the next financial year should be based on a 2½% increase on this year's precepted figure, possibly with a higher increase on street lighting if it proves that the replacement lamp in the Hall grounds is the responsibility of the Parish Council. No Capital Grant would be required.

(c) Clerk's Salary/Terms & Conditions: Following discussions between the Chairman, Mrs Ingram and the Clerk, terms and conditions of employment had been agreed, based on 2.5 hours work per week at £6.69 per hour (2002 review awaited) together with a further £100 per year. This was agreed.

(d) Donation requests had been received from the WRVS and Victim Support. These would be deferred until a future meeting.

(e) Audit. The Internal Auditors have been appointed by NALC and will be contacting Councils soon. It was noted that the Co-operative Bank had rectified the error in the 2001/02 Accounts but the correction is in this year's accounts. The Clerk is awaiting advice from the Internal Auditor on this point.

Further wood burning had taken place at Tower Field over the previous weekend. Wellingborough Council had been made aware.

It was noted that three chestnut trees in the cricket field had died. Fisher German to be informed.

There had been publicity over the possible closure of the Police Station at Eurls Barton, with Ecton possibly being policed from Irchester.

It was agreed to write to Inspector Colman to seek clarification on this matter.

So, on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup> October there will be another Grand Daffodil Planting taking place along the bank of the main Wellingborough Road and other selected areas within the village.

## ECTON VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Thanks to the many people who supported the Summer Barbecue we made a profit of around £580 towards the refurbishment of the Hall.

A big thank you also for a very generous cheque received from the Ecton Golden Jubilee Committee together with a donation from the WI Food and Wine Evening. This is all helping to swell our coffers for the refurbishment programme, which in the end will provide a comfortable meeting hall and benefit us all.

Unfortunately, in June we failed for the third time to obtain a grant from the Community Fund (Lotteries Fund). Apparently our application fulfilled all the requested criteria but the Fund had simply run out of money! Now with new rules for applications for village halls, and Northamptonshire in particular, it is just not worth applying to them again. In view of this, the Committee has decided to try other avenues for funding and to plan the refurbishment in several stages. We are very hopeful of being successful with a grant from Wellingborough Borough Council and Northants County Council to begin the first stage but shall not know until the end of September.

In the meantime our own fundraising continues with further events planned. Notices will be put in the village magazine and on the notice board.

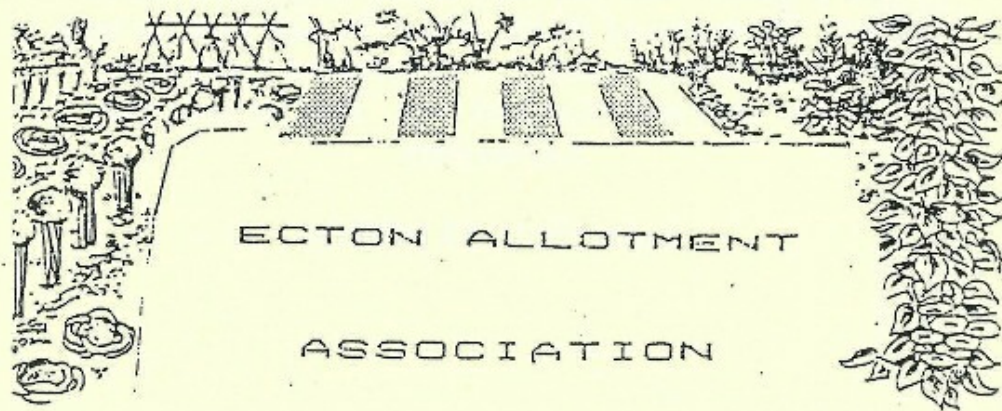
